# Portland Adult Education: more than meets the eye

Portland Adult Education has many faces. Some think that we primarily (and almost exclusively) teach English to speakers of other languages (ESOL). Others think it's an adult school where our primary job is to help people complete their high school degrees. There is also some awareness that we provide workforce training programs. Some know the secret that if they are an internationally-trained professional (ITP) they can go to NMRC and get their credentials translated and evaluated, receive advice on their transition plans, and leverage their training and skills for the new environment they find themselves in. Yet others know of the community-based enrichment programs where they can learn Italian, painting, yoga, photography, and more.

So what is PAE? What do we exactly do? The truth is, we do it all, and that is what creates our unique class offerings. The diversity of class offerings at various levels, and aimed at different goals—immediate employment vs. further education, for instance—offers surprising cross-pollination and innovation that are a result of the serendipitous meetings of minds in the eclectic place that is PAE.

We now have a math class offered in the context of the workforce department called, “Foundational Math Skills for Professional Careers” developed and co-taught by the Math/Science department chair, **Carol Hager**, and Workforce department chair, **Barbara Mascareñas**. This was developed

in response to the observation that some of our graduates with the mathematical knowledge and abilities were struggling to translate that knowledge into their workplaces. This made sense to me: I still do all my mental math in Japanese. That must be the same for others who also learned math and a whole numerical system in another language.

The math/science department has seen immense growth with over 100 students enrolled at the beginning of fall. The workforce department has also seen big changes: For one, the classes are now 12-weeks long so that their schedule is in line with the rest of the school. This helps stabilize student schedules, and makes it easier for them to join workforce classes and academic classes (including ESOL) simultaneously.

The sheer scale of PAE, with a total of about 3,000 people registered in our classes a year, across the three domains of Academics, Career Services, and Enrichment is immense. In fact, we are the largest school in the

largest public school district in the state. Our annual budget has increased from \$3.5 million to \$5.2 million in the past 5 years. Finding enough classroom space (and parking space), hiring people to teach and support the operations, and securing financial resources to support all of these activities remains a constant challenge. FPAE's support has made many of these crucially responsive moves possible and I am deeply grateful for the ongoing collaboration and support.

# FPAE brings teachers' ideas to life

FPAE donors help us fund many important projects for PAE initiatives; generally, the programs would not be covered by the budget allocated by Portland Public Schools. Most of the ideas making the greatest impact on PAE student-learning are those brought to us by the people who know the needs of students, the facilities, and the school best: our staff and teachers.

We continue to be amazed by our instructors' dedication and creativity, demonstrated by how they work to inspire their students to learn. Teachers' requests for funding include projects that nurture students' minds, bodies, spirit, and environment.

Here are some examples of the support FPAE was able to provide over the past year:

- ESOL teachers **Dwight Sholes** and **Barbara Fiore** submitted a proposal to host multilingual students on a field trip to Wolfe's Neck Center in Freeport. Over 40 people participated, including 15 kids and 6 volunteers. At the Center, the group enjoyed an educational presentation, a seaside hike, and a picnic lunch with a lovely view of the farm. For many, this was their first time experiencing the beauty of Maine outside of the city center of Portland. The program was so successful we're working to make the "Outing Club" an ongoing offering at PAE.

- Workforce instructor **Geneva Meserve** alerted us to the need for her CNA students to have better equipment on which to learn and hone their skills. We provided the funds for a new Hoyer lift, a mechanical device designed to help caregivers safely lift and transfer individuals with limited mobility. We also secured new stethoscopes and other essential medical supplies for the classroom.
- ESOL Regional Learning Opportunities Specialist, **Haley Bizimana**, who coordinates PAE's ESOL Summer Program, was concerned about her students trying to concentrate in hot classrooms. Three air conditioning units were purchased and installed just in time for this past summer's beastly heatwave!
- Members of PAE's **Beautification Committee** wanted every nook and cranny of the PAE school building to be bright and welcoming – even the basement! Their requests funded a spectacular mural in a large common space, artwork for the walls, and plants that add more pops of life and color.
- Sometimes, the smallest grants can have the greatest impact. **Elisabeth Lualdi**, PAE's former Learning Lab Assistant, requested funds to show her lab volunteers how much she appreciates their help. For less than \$100, the group went bowling, had a pizza party, visited the Portland Head Light, and stopped for ice cream. A small price for their critical help!



**Sedrina Rodrigues** is a shining example of hard work and determination. She earned her High School Diploma in just one year at PAE. On top of that, she completed our rigorous Teller Training Program, preparing her for a career in the U.S. banking world. Today, Sedrina is thriving at **Norway Savings Bank**. "I'm a strong believer in education and opportunities," said Sedrina.

She quickly took advantage of both, earning a high school diploma in a single year and excelling in her studies at **Portland Adult Education** and **Southern Maine Community College**. It was during her time at PAE that she became involved in the school's Teller Training Program.

"The Teller Training Program allowed me to take a deeper

dive into having a better understanding of what teller responsibilities are and how to accurately manage the position," Sedrina said. "**Norway Savings Bank** was one of the partners involved with the Teller Training Program and I was fortunate enough to be able to make a great connection."

For over a year, Sedrina has been successfully connecting with customers and team members alike as a valued member of NSB.

"Sedrina has been so successful since she arrived at NSB. ## Seeing clearly: the Jane Cleaves Vision Fund in action

FPAE does not stand alone in its support of Portland Adult Education. Community members donate financially, their time, and their expertise. With this assistance, FPAE is able to provide our students with the tools to help them succeed academically, and professionally. One example of this help is FPAE’s ongoing relationship with the **Yarmouth Lions Club** and their annual donation through the **Jane Cleaves Vision Fund**.

The **Jane Cleaves Vision Fund** provides the funds for a supply of reading glasses that students can ask for in the PAE office. It will also cover the cost of a student’s prescription glasses. One difficulty is that many of PAE’s students do not have eye care coverage and cannot pay for an eye exam to get that prescription.

This past school year, FPAE has received help from two local businesses, who offered their time to give free vision screenings to our students. In February,

**Dr. Michelle Higgins O.D.** from **Insight EyeCare** in Yarmouth, along with office support from **Rich Young**, opened their office on a Saturday to see eight PAE students. Some of those students needed prescription glasses, some eye drops, and some just needed reading glasses with basic magnification.

Students have also received vision screenings from **Eye Care & Eye Wear Center of Maine** in Westbrook. Both **Dr. Eric Roush, O.D.** and **Dr. Jennifer Haverkamp, O.D.** donated

appointments monthly during the school year, since April 2024. With coordination and scheduling done by their office manager, **Becky Cavalero**, we have been able to help another six students improve their studies with clearer vision. We are happy to have a continuing relationship with them this fall; two students have been seen in October.

A new program is coming in January. A mobile vision clinic, through **20/20 Onsite** has been organized by **Andrea Weisman Summers**, Executive Director at the **Foundation for Portland Public Schools**. FPAE board members, **Sharon Lacey** and **Valerie DeVuyt**, have met with Andrea and 20/20 Onsite representatives to plan for the ‘vision van’ and learn what is needed to bring it to PAE. With successful fundraising efforts, Andrea has made these screenings a reality across the Portland Public Schools district.

## The power of pictures: crafting e-books for everyone

This project began organically among teachers in the Beginner ESOL level, modeling books after the series of adult literacy texts from Bow Valley College in Canada. **Sally Regan**, a beloved ESOL Literacy teacher at PAE, left some money for FPAE in her bequest upon her death in 2021, and that money was earmarked for these special publications. describes Ruth’s journey to school. It includes language about schedules, time, and transportation.



### Victor Needs Boots

is about the dilemma of someone who lives in Maine in the winter, but needs appropriate footwear.

This is a common problem for new immigrants in Portland, and the book includes language about weather and clothing.



### Visiting a Friend

tells the story of a friend visiting from out of town, chronicling a week of activities. It has language specific to places in the Portland area, days of the week, and common verbs.

This past July, Virginie and Rochelle presented the PAE e-books to participants at the **Maine Department of Education’s Summer Multilingual Learners Institute** at Sugarloaf. Participants from various Adult Education programs in the state were excited about the prospect of making their own books for their programs, including creating e-books for beginner Math students, using them for student onboarding and having parents make bilingual e-books for their children.

## Writing Center returns for year five!

# ESOL students host state & local issues forum

Just days before election day, ESOL students at PAE hosted a **State and Local Issues Forum** at Rines Auditorium in the **Portland Public Library**. 75 PAE students ranging in age from 20 to 86, and originating from countries across the globe—including Somalia, Guinea, Turkey, Angola, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Sudan, and Congo Brazzaville— participated.

In preparation for the forum, students prepared questions on issues they researched in their ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) classes. This event was part of a larger initiative to educate PAE students about U.S. government structures, the importance of civic participation, and key issues affecting their local communities.

"This fall, students in our advanced ESOL and Language Arts classes have not only worked hard to improve their English writing and speaking skills. They've also been challenged to think critically about the world

around them," said **Shoshana Hoose**, the ESOL teacher who developed the curriculum. "This forum was an incredible opportunity for our students to have thoughtful discussions with community leaders about the issues that matter to them most."

The forum demonstrated PAE's commitment to fostering civic engagement and inclusivity among its diverse learners. Thank you to **Friends of Portland Adult Education** for making it possible!
